



Scope

Global Responsibility to Protect (GR2P) is the premier journal for the study and practice of the responsibility to protect (R2P). This journal seeks to publish the best and latest research on the R2P principle, its development as a new norm in global politics, its operationalization through the work of governments, international and regional organizations and NGOs, and finally, its relationship and applicability to past and present cases of genocide and mass atrocities including the global response to those cases. *Global Responsibility to Protect* also serves as a repository for lessons learned and analysis of best practices; it will disseminate information about the current status of R2P and efforts to realize its promise. Each issue contains research articles and at least one piece on the practicalities of R2P, be that the current state of R2P diplomacy or its application in the field. *Global Responsibility to Protect* promotes a universal understanding of R2P and efforts to realize it, through encouraging critical debate and diversity of opinion, and to acquaint a broad readership of scholars, practitioners, students and analysts with the principle and its operationalization. *Global Responsibility to Protect* seeks insights and approaches from every region of the world that might contribute to understanding, operationalizing and applying R2P in practice.

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Double-blinded Peer Review

GR2P uses a double-blind peer review system, which means that manuscript author(s) do not know who the reviewers are, and that reviewers do not know the names of the author(s). When you submit your article via Editorial Manager, you will be asked to submit a separate title page which includes the full title of the manuscript plus the names and complete contact details of all authors. This page will not be accessible to the referees. All other files (manuscript, figures, tables, etc.) should not contain any information concerning author names, institutions, etc. The names of these files and the document properties should also be anonymized.

Submission Requirements

Types of Contributions

Submissions are sought from academics and practitioners conducting work related to R2P. Potential themes and topics include, but are not limited to:

Language

Manuscripts should be written in British English: 'ise' rather than '-ize' (e.g. 'organise', 'organisation'), '-our' rather than '-or' (e.g. 'honour', 'armour'). Other key spellings include: defence, judgment, asylum seeker (not asylum-seeker), NGOs (not NGO's), UN (not U.N.). Use a comma before 'and' and 'or' when listing three or more items (e.g. 'this, that, and the other'). Spelling should be consistent throughout.

Length

Articles should be between 8,000 and 10,000 words (including footnotes).

Manuscript Structure

Articles should be written in Times New Roman, 12 pt font size, and be double spaced. As the Journal uses double-blinded peer review, submissions should be made anonymous. Authors should not identify themselves or their affiliation anywhere on the manuscript. They should include a separate cover sheet with name, affiliation, complete contact information, and a brief biographical note. Please read the Instructions for Authors carefully; the editors may ask for manuscripts to be re-written before sending them out for review if they do not meet the style guidelines.

Abstract and Keywords

Authors should include an abstract of no more than 250 words and six to ten keywords.

Headings

The use of headings and subheadings is encouraged. Headings should be 12 pt bold, first level subheading should be 12 pt italics.



Paragraphs

Do not use a left tab for the beginning of new paragraphs. Insert one extra line between paragraphs.

Quotations

Use single quotation marks; only use double quotation marks for quotes within quotes. Quotations exceeding 40 words should be displayed in left-right indented form, separate paragraph, single spaced and without quotation marks; while shorter ones should be retained (with quotation marks) within the body of the text. Punctuation should be placed outside the quotation mark, unless it needs to remain inside to reflect original meaning of the text. Spelling within quotes should reflect the original. Where changes must be made, they should be put in square brackets, (e.g. '[and also]').

Date

Use the form '1 January 2012', without commas.

Other Points

Spell out acronyms when they first appear. Avoid using 'e.g.', 'i.e.', 'etc.'. Capitalise people's titles (e.g. 'Francis Deng is Special Adviser to the Secretary-General for the Prevention of Genocide'). Write 'Second World War' rather than 'World War II'; 'Cold War', not 'cold war'.

References and Citations

Please use numbered footnotes, not endnotes or a bibliography. Authors are responsible for the accuracy of quotations and for supplying complete and correct references. All references should be spelt out in full at first mention. For subsequent mentions the citation should be abbreviated to surname and a short form of the title (only include the date if necessary for clarification). See *The Chicago Manual of Style* for less common forms of citation. Do not use 'op. cit.' or 'supra' to refer to earlier references, but do use 'ibid.' to refer to the immediately preceding reference.
